



SCIENCE DEPARTMENT SPOTLIGHT

Science is concerned with discovering and describing the world around us by observing and experimenting. Those observations and experimental results allow us to understand natural phenomena and make predictions about how things behave, whether they're living things, chemical reactions or physical events.

In the Science department at Venerable Bede CE Academy, we aim to develop pupils' understanding by using engaging scientific concepts that are at large in the modern world. Our aim is to encourage an appreciation of the importance of science that opens doors for pupils. This is best done by showing how science is involved in everyone's lives.

Some great examples of this are:

Vaccines – Not only have scientists managed to develop vaccines that offer protection against Covid-19, but they've done it using a type of vaccine that has never been used before. In the future, this new type of vaccination might be able to offer protection against diseases that at the moment are impossible to prevent.

Global Warming – Surely the biggest threat to our lives on this planet is that posed by climate change caused by global warming. Switching to cleaner methods of transport and energy production are the obvious immediate improvements we're making, and these couldn't happen without scientists and engineers.

Space – Never before have we been at as important a time for space exploration and discovery as we are now. Private companies are on the verge of developing reusable craft that could take people and materials into space. And how long will it be before we land astronauts on the Moon or Mars again? Will they stay there?










Whilst learning from home, pupils in all year groups

Working together we evolved our provision quickly to ensure not only the efficient, uninterrupted and inclusive delivery of our DEEP curriculum, but also to safeguard the whole person, providing resources for enrichment, Worship & Prayer as well as mental health and wellbeing.

Those who required support to access learning were provided with the technology to do so, or printed resources to ensure that no one was left behind!

RECIPROCAL READING


During this academic year, the school has been involved in a project run by FFT and Belfast University called One Reciprocal Reading Project.

Our Year 7 pupils have been taking part in morning intervention sessions run by our HLTA in English, Mrs Surtees. The pupils have been following the Reciprocal Reading strategy: reading a text; making predictions; clarifying vocabulary;

answering questions and summarising what they have read. This has been an exciting project to be involved in, as the research is being used to look at reading strategies for the DFE. This project will continue into the Academic Year 2021/2022 and hopefully we will see much improvement in outcomes.

As well as using the Reciprocal Reading strategy for morning intervention, we have also implemented it into the Literacy lessons for Year 7 and Year 8. All pupils in these year groups have now had the chance to improve both reading and vocabulary skills using this strategy.

We have found this to have a greater impact than previous methods that we used in Literacy lessons. Our pupils have said the lessons are more enjoyable.



READING HUB & MENTAL HEALTH



Mental Health is something that has been talked about a lot more in recent years, and is more important than ever, bearing in mind the changes that the COVID pandemic has brought about.

Our Learning Resource Centre has just launched a new SHELF HELP COLLECTION (self help on a shelf). We now have a designated space for books dealing with aspects of mental health and wellbeing. You can find a mixture of fiction, non fiction and poetry, aiming to support and encourage pupils who are having a tough time,

but also helping all of us in the school community to empathise with what other people might be going through.

Some books have already been read and recommended by Mrs Holmes, and some by pupils. Others have been selected from the Reading Well and Empathy Lab projects.



COVID-19 CONSULTATION

HOICES Pupil Voice is extremely

important at Venerable Bede Academy, particularly in light of the pandemic. We were asked by Children North East, a local charity working with Newcastle University, to be part of the Voices Project, a report into the impact of the National Lockdown on the lives of young people in our region. We jumped at the chance!

Initially, 85 pupils from Year 7 to Year 9 were asked to complete a brief survey about the positive and negative

aspects of the pandemic and what is the most important thing to them now.

Understandably, there were many comments that showed just how hard it has been for our young people, such as,

"Online learning wouldn't stick in my head"

"It's been a year of instability without seeing people. I worry I've forgotten how to talk to them. It's going to take some time getting used to However, there were positive outcomes too!

"I've enjoyed focusing on myself, looking after myself and learning not to stress about the little things.

In the second stage, a selection of 30 pupils from Year 7 to Year 10 took part in online focus groups to establish a deeper understanding of their experiences and how Covid has affected their lives. Every pupil involved in the study demonstrated excellent manners and consideration of the impact beyond themselves when answering questions:

"I worry about bringing home covid to my nana who is on her own. I worry about her keeping safe."

"It's better being back at school where you can see people. I'm glad I'm back at school as I can see my friends and make sure they are alright because during lockdown it was hard to check up on others."

PLASTIC FREE ALTERNATIVES - SENIOR PREFECT REPORT

In response to City of Sunderland's' e-update in June, we thought we would take the opportunity to share Venerable Bede's journey with

Our senior prefects raised their concerns about the amount of unrecycled plastic the school produced in the form of plastic drinks' bottles in the canteen.

This was taken to the Autumn term student council meeting and a poll of pupils found that they would like to see drinks bottles replaced with a recyclable alternative. The school council has worked with the kitchen suppliers to replace all drinks with recyclable alternatives, both cardboard cartons and aluminium cans.

Pupils are investigating recycling schemes in the North- east and collecting the waste



drink cans to recycle responsibly. In addition a group of pupils have suggested having reusable drinks bottles for all and the school is pupils sourcing this on their behalf. This will be supported further with drinks bottles available in the school's online rewards shop.
