Emotional Literacy Provision

Hello, my name is Mrs Johnson and I have been working at Venerable Bede CE Academy as a Learning Support Assistant (LSA) for nearly 18 years. Recently, I moved to a new role within school as HLTA (Higher Level Teaching Assistant) for Emotional Resilience. In my new role, I continue to support pupils learning within lessons, as well as delivering small group and one to one intervention sessions focusing on emotional literacy and resilience.

Emotional literacy is about understanding and coping with feelings about ourselves and others; it helps increase selfesteem and resilience, encourages positive interactions with others as well as helping pupils to focus better on their learning.

The focus of these sessions can include supporting pupils in recognising and managing uncomfortable emotions, building self-esteem, strengthening resilience and working on positive relationships. It can also involve supporting pupils through loss and bereavement.

The emotional literacy sessions are bespoke to meet pupils' individual needs and can include games, activities or simply giving space to talk.



CURRICULUM CHOICES EVENING 2023 Contributed by Mrs T Burgess

On Thursday 27th of April 2023 we held a curriculum choices evening at The Venerable Bede Academy for Year 9 pupils, parents and carers. The evening was led by Mrs Burgess, Deputy Head Teacher, who said " Choosing the subjects for your KS4 journey is one of the many important decisions that you will have to make about your future. It is important that you select your subject choices wisely, after thought and consultation with your teachers and parents or carers. Your GCSE courses will last for two years. If your choices are subjects that interest you, and that you enjoy, you will be motivated to do well in them."

Prior to the evening, pupils were given their curriculum choices booklet, designed to inform pupils of what each course involves along with details of how each course is assessed and examined.

After the opening presentation, pupils, parents and carers were given the opportunity to talk to staff from the subject areas and ask any questions they had.

Pupils, parents and carers found the evening very informative and enjoyed being able to speak to staff face to face. We have captured some of the comments made by pupils.

"The evening helped my parents understand all the options as well as myself. Overall it helped me decide what lessons I would like to take in Year 10" (Layla)

"The options evening helped me pick what I wanted to take for GCSE because it answered my questions and squashed any worries about subjects that I was originally sceptical about" (Matthew)



Y7 EMOTIONAL WELL-BEING

This half term the school nurse has been back in school delivering emotional wellbeing sessions to some of our Y7 tutor groups.

The workshops have been designed to promote resilience skills in our young people and to encourage them to address the effects of emotional and mental health issues in a fun and interactive way. The aim is to encourage young people to open up and talk about how they feel.

Y8 KNIFE CRIME AWARENESS

This half term, Northumbria Violence Reduction Unit have visited the Academy to deliver a presentation on knife crime awareness.

The presentation was designed to prevent youth violence and look at the consequences for the person who commits the crime, the victim and their families. There are many reasons why people will get caught up in knife crime: they could be involved in criminality, they might think a knife will protect them but instead it gets used against them, or they might just be in the wrong place at the wrong time.

Here are some key facts to use in your conversations with young people about knife crime:

It is a criminal offence to have in a public place any item that has a blade, or is sharply pointed. This includes scissors, kitchen knives and craft knives.



It is illegal for anyone under 18 to buy a knife of any sort.

It is not legal to carry a knife for self-defence.

If you are caught by police carrying a knife, even if it was for your protection or you were carrying it for someone else, you will be arrested and prosecuted.

If you use a knife, even in selfdefence, you could be charged with assault with intent, or even worse.

You can go to prison even if you didn't use the knife.

Police can stop and search anyone they believe is carrying a knife.

Carrying a knife significantly increases your chances of getting stabbed yourself.

If someone is injured or killed by a knife in your presence, you could be prosecuted even if you didn't touch the knife. You could even go to prison for murder in what is called 'joint enterprise'.

There is no 'safe place' to stab someone. A wound in the arm or leg can still kill someone if an artery is severed.

If a knife punctures an artery you can bleed to death within five minutes.

A criminal record for knife use or possession can stop you from being accepted into college or university, and can make it much harder to get a job.

Y9 SEXUAL HEALTH

This half term our Sexual Health Outreach Lead has been back in school delivering sexual health workshops to some of our Y9 tutor groups.

The workshops have been designed to develop pupils awareness on sexually transmitted diseases, unwanted pregnancy, coercion, violence and discrimination. Sexual health is a big part of life. It can affect and is affected by other aspects of health. This includes physical, mental, emotional, and social health. Being in good sexual health means you are well informed, careful, and respectful to yourself and others.

It was a day filled with lively discussion and engaging presentations all centred around best practice for engaging with children and young people.

The day began with an act of collective Worship which was planned and delivered by staff and pupils from our academy.

Our Worship focused on the combined themes of 'Love' and 'Engaging Children

and Young People'.

Participants of the Synod w e r e welcomed into our main hall w i t h reflective m u s i c played on piano

by VB pupils Alex and Sam which deftly set the tone for the day.

The Worship was then opened by Executive Headteacher for Secondary Education, Northern Lights Learning Trust, Mrs

G Booth who spoke on how Worship and Eucharist have evolved over the years here at VB and the many strategies we employ to engage as many members of our community as possible.

Mrs Booth then handed to our Associate Chaplain, Canon Dave Tolhurst, who explored the themes and welcomed contributions from some of our pupils who took part in reflections and readings via pre-recorded video and audio recording. he then introduced Senior Prefects, Erin and Andrew, who led us in both some rousing congregational singing (a deeply effective performance of 'Glorious Day which the pupils had arranged and rehearsed themselves) and in our Prayers of Intercession.
