### BISHOP VINNIE VISIT



It was a great pleasure for our Trust to welcome Bishop Vicentia of the Lesotho Church of England Diocese on her most recent visit to the UK.

As the first female bishop of Lesotho; Bishop Vinnie, as she prefers to be known, is a remarkable lady, and we were delighted that she was able to take some time from her busy itinerary to spend an inspirational morning talking with pupils from Ian Ramsay Academy and Venerable Bede Academy.

Bishop Vinnie was keen to share with our pupils anecdotes from her life and experiences growing up in Southern Africa, during the time of apartheid. Having grown up in Soweto, a township in Johannesburg, Bishop

Vinnie studied hard at school and earned a place at university studying Law. She later decided to dedicate her life to the Church and become a female priest. Bishop Vinnie pointed out to our pupils that this was unusual in Southern Africa at that time, and yet despite her father stating that,

"Women do not become priests"

she was undeterred in her belief that this was her calling in life.

The position of Bishop of Lesotho is a very prestigious post, in a country known for it's strong Christian beliefs. The appointment of a female Bishop illustrates the progressive nature of this beautiful country. Nevertheless, Bishop Vinnie has faced numerous challenges

and shared some of her stories with pupils. Leaving them in awe of this incredible and inspirational lady.

Our trust has worked with a number of organisations in Lesotho since 2006, when staff visited with a view to finding a global project that pupils could support. Venerable Bede Academy has been running an annual visit to Lesotho since 2008, until the COVID Pandemic prevented foreign travel for school trips.

Opportunities such as these are important for so many reasons: they offer a unique chance for students to learn outside of the classroom, for them to form new friendships, to push themselves and see their teachers in a different light. But our project does this and so much more as well. It empowers our students to help those less fortunate than themselves, it offers a unique experience which at times can be quite daunting when you're only 14 and teaches them they can achieve more than they realise. It demands team work, patience and resilience to raise the funding to go and enables pupils to reflect upon their lives, to review the simple things that they sometimes take for granted such as, their education, their home life, and their faith.

The experience of Bishop Vinnie's visit to our trust has left pupils and teachers with excitement and optimism at the chance of relaunching our Lesotho visit in the very near future.





## DIOCESAN SYNOD HOSTED AT VENERABLE BEDE

It was our privilege, once again, to host the Durham Diocesan Synod meeting, here at Venerable Bede CE Academy.

It was a day filled with lively discussion and engaging presentations all centred around best practice for engaging with children and



The day began with an act of Collective Worship which was planned and delivered by staff and pupils from our academy.

Our Worship focused on the combined themes of 'Love' and 'Engaging Children and Young People'.

former Executive Headteacher for Secondary Education, Northern Lights Learning Trust, Mrs G Booth who spoke on how Worship and Eucharist have evolved over the years here at VB and the many strategies we employ to engage as many members of our community as possible.

Mrs Booth then handed to our Associate Chaplain, Canon Dave Tolhurst, who explored the themes and welcomed contributions from some of our pupils who took part in reflections and readings via pre-recorded video and audio recording. he then introduced Senior Prefects, Erin and Andrew, who led us in both some rousing congregational singing (a deeply effective performance of 'Glorious Day which the pupils had arranged and rehearsed themselves) and in our Prayers of Intercession.

The Worship garnered several comments of positive feedback with many of the facilitators mentioning the contributions of our pupils in particular, as a highlight of the day and a wonderful, inspiring way to begin the proceedings.

Bishop of Durham Paul Butler delivered his presidential address (bit.ly/VBCEDSPA) during which he thanked our academy and our pupils for delivering the opening Worship, spoke about the recent Coronation of HM King Charles III, and also provided several interesting points for discussion.

# PILGRIMAGE TO HOLY ISLAND

The Holy Island of Lindisfarne lies just off Northumberland's north coast, close to the border with Scotland, and reached by a causeway, Holy Island is totally cut off from the mainland twice a day when the tide comes in.

With strong connections to both St Aidan and St Cuthbert, Lindisfarne is one of England's most important centres of early Christianity, hence the name, Holy Island. The island became a popular pilgrimage site and, as a group Year 9 pupils and staff did in July, it's still possible to walk in the footsteps of the early pilgrims to reach Holy Island, following the line of poles that can clearly be seen in the sand.

The Celtic saints often referred to somewhere as a 'thin place' when the spiritual atmosphere of a location made it easy to connect with God, almost as though there is no barrier between heaven and earth.

Year 9's and staff had an amazing experience when we

had a day trip to Lindisfarne (Holy Island).

During the trip the weather was beautiful as we followed the steps of former pilgrims along with young people from other Anglican schools in the North East. The three-mile pilgrimage was followed by a church service on the island and some free time in the village.
















that is in over 100 countries around the world.


The aim of World Book Day is to encourage pupils to read more and build a lifelong habit of

reading. It is a day when children are introduced to new books, authors and genres. They are encouraged to explore and enjoy the world of literature. The idea of World Book Day was first proposed in 1923 by the Spanish writer Vic Clavel Andres.

On World Book Day, we decided to share in the love of reading as a whole school community. All teachers were given the same short story to read, 'The Lottery' by Shirley Jackson (1948), with all of their classes where they would read a page at the beginning of each period. This meant that, as a school, we were all enthralled in where the plot of the story would take us. It encouraged us to consider the message behind the story and students were eager to discuss their opinions at the end of the day.

Form classes were also asked to create World Book Day posters to display on the doors around the school with their most enjoyed and liked books that they have read. Some groups decided to share their love for one book with a

review about what they enjoyed about it, whilst others printed book covers as suggestions or recommendations for their peers.

All pupils enjoyed the event and were a credit to the school, not only for their behaviour, but their enthusiasm and participation in tasks throughout the day.






AMSP Maths Feast 2023 Relay Round – A1

NATIONAL APPRENTICESHIPS WEEK 2023



During the week of February 6th to 10th, we introduced pupils across the school to apprenticeships as part of National Apprenticeships Week 2023. During this week, tutors shared with their tutor groups what it means to be an apprentice. areas in which apprenticeships are offered and stories from apprentices about their experiences.

Throughout school, we have displayed information for pupils around the apprenticeships available that are linked to particular subject areas and encouraged them to follow links to find out more information.

Our Year 11 pupils have had the opportunity to listen to presentations from representatives of local companies such as Nissan. Cummins, BAE Systems and Gentoo. As part of this event, pupils had the opportunity to find out more about the work each company does, as well as the various, local apprenticeships available; ask questions about the necessary skills and qualifications and even apply for apprenticeships right then and there

During work experience week, 16 pupils had the fantastic opportunity to take part in 'Try-Z', an event run by Nissan Employees in school. Pupils started by building a model car out of 70+ parts, throughout the week they focused on improving the quality and performance of their cars. In groups of 8, they produced 15 cars by Friday. The aim of the challenge was to beat the other team for the best cost per production run, focusing on continuous improvement, problem solving, safety and team work.
